### **Preserving Our Legacy**

As part of Triton College's 60-year anniversary celebration, the campus community collected artifacts for a new time capsule that will remain sealed and buried until its recovery on the college's 100-year anniversary. The capsule was buried Sept. 30 at the center of west campus. Prior to the capsule burial, the artifacts were on display in the college's Library, offering a unique chance to view the memorabilia, documents and items that will represent the campus community to the future. Artifacts enclosed in the time capsule range from solar eclipse glasses to a "Troy the Trojan" mascot baseball card to copies of the college's newspaper, Fifth Avenue Journal. Also included was a pair of student-signed cardigan sweaters from the Triumph and Surge student organizations, a River Grove Fire Department medallion, a Triton College "bucket" hat and other items representing current trends.

### **Two New Certificate Programs Launched to Elevate Student Success**

Triton College's School of Continuing Education is offering two new certificate programs aimed at helping students achieve their career goals.

In partnership with Dohrn Insurance Training, Inc., Triton is offering an insurance licensing certification. This opportunity will equip students with the skills needed to sell various types of insurance, including accident and health, property and casualty upon completing the certification.

The course is offered in person and online, with ongoing open enrollment throughout the semester. Textbooks are provided in PDF form with supplemental study guides from Dohrn SimX, an online prelicensing simulating exam database.

"Dohrn Insurance is a hidden gem in the community," said Katie Rullo, associate dean of Continuing Education at Triton College. "Doug Dohrn is also a staple in the insurance industry. This is a great addition to the real estate package we have offered at the college."

Triton College is also offering a human resources certification, made possible through Illinois Community College Board's Noncredit Workforce Training Initiative. This certification prepares students for success in a fast-paced and growing field.

"According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics' Job Outlook, jobs within the human resources field are expected to increase 6% over the next several years, which is 3% faster than the average growth of all other occupations," said Dr. Bianca Sola-Perkins, dean of Triton's School of Continuing Education.

The first course, Society for Human Resource Management (SHRM) Exam Prep, prepares students for the SHRM National Certification Exam. Upon completing the course, students receive a certificate of completion, enhancing their expertise and providing a competitive edge when applying for jobs.

The second course, the Human Resources Management Program course, explores essential principles and practices of human resources management.

Triton's School of Continuing Education is also offering a holiday cooking class on Tuesday, Nov. 12, 5-9:30 p.m. Warm up the holidays by learning how to create a delicious meal with seasonal favorites, such as roasted chicken, potatoes and a veggie casserole.

Chair of Triton College's Science Department, Dr. Sheldon Turner, recently had an article published in a national science magazine. The article, The Benefits of Empowering Community College Geoscience Faculty, highlights Dr. Turner's experience in the STEAMSEAS Program. As part of the Science, Technology, Engineering and Math Student Experiences Abroad Ships (STEAMSEAS) Dr. Turner, along with 13 other U.S. faculty members from two-year colleges, embarked on a 10-day expedition between Seattle and Honolulu to not only conduct research at sea, but to learn how to recruit future student participants and faculty mentors to the program. The article was published in Eos, a science magazine of advancing earth and space sciences (AGU).

"I love how GLoW mainly centers around women," said camp participant Rory Colchamiro in the article. "It's great to see that there's things like this available to help empower women to start doing things they like."
