Triton Alumni Design Inspiring Memorial

For Lukasz Gimier and Joshua Reynolds, alumni of Triton College, the River Grove Veterans Memorial is both emotional and joyful.

The memorial not only honors the memory of those who served, but also showcases Gimier and Reynolds' architectural design.

About 12 years ago, River Grove residents Mike Warchol and Bart Smith sought to build a veterans memorial in their community. Warchol, who chaired the commission to build the memorial, couldn't afford to hire an architect and invited Triton College students to contribute designs. He organized a contest among eight students, with Gimier and Reynolds winning the project.

Warchol said it took 10 years to secure the parcel of land for the memorial, located at 8678 W. Grand Ave. The village of River Grove ultimately purchased the property from the Forest Preserves with the help of fundraisers and support from the Triton College Foundation, which contributed \$15,000.

Triton Instructor Wins Prestigious Filmmaker Award

Triton College adjunct instructor Marshall Gibson can now add award-winning filmmaker to his ever-growing resume. Gibson won the prestigious Sergio Mims Award at the Black Harvest Film Festival for his film, *Life in My Eyes*.

The film centers around Gibson's childhood friend, Stephen Anderson, who is visually impaired. After experiencing a stroke at the age of 30, Anderson underwent rehabilitation to regain the skills

needed for independent living. *Life in My Eyes* focuses on Anderson's day-to-day life, as well as others who are visually impaired.

"Receiving this honor is a humbling experience, especially for my first film," said Gibson. "To submit work in honor of Sergio Mims' name is an amazing achievement."

With over 400 film submissions, only 117 films from 18 different countries were chosen to be a part of the festival this past fall.

Outside of filmmaking, Gibson teaches two classes at Triton, Graphic Design and Designing for Social Media.

"It's a growing learning curve and I'm here for the ride," he said.

Triton Trainer Wins Powerlifting Competition

Alejandro "Alex" Jimenez, a personal trainer at Triton College and a dedicated powerlifter, won first place in his weight class at the World Powerlifting Congress this past fall. Held in Lisle, Illinois, Jimenez faced top athletes from 46 countries.

"My goal was to be the best athlete and coach I could be," he said.

Jimenez competed in three key lifting categories: squat, bench press and deadlift. He did a 500-pound squat, a 320-pound bench and a 578-pound deadlift. This victory led him to the title of world champion, along with a medal, certificate, an opportunity at next year's competition and, of course, bragging rights.

"I want to beat those numbers at my next competition," he said. "I want to keep getting stronger."

Individuals interested in personal training with Jimenez can enroll through Triton College's School of Continuing Education for four, six or 12 sessions. Jimenez's flexible schedule allows him to accommodate students based on availability.

Giving High Schoolers a Chance to Earn College Credit



Triton College's Career Academy allows academically qualified in-district high school students a unique opportunity to get a head start on their college education and career. By enrolling at Triton, students can earn college credits and even pursue post-secondary certificates, setting them on a path to success both in college and in life.

"Our in-district high schools have seen strong interest from students and asked Triton College to develop this program," said Alexandria Terrazas, dean of Triton's Early College Program.

Career Academy programs include Barbering, Emergency Medical Technician (EMT), Fire Science, Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA), Welding, Heating and Air Conditioning, among many others.

"We are meeting needs for several high-demand jobs," said Terrazas. "The result is a stronger workforce and a boost to our local economies."

Career Academy is part of Triton College's Early College Program, which offers students three opportunities to earn college credit or receive an associate degree or an industry certificate. The opportunities are Dual Credit, Dual Enrollment and Dual Degree college programs, allowing high school students to take college courses and earn credits while completing their high school education.

Terrazas highlighted that the Career Academy enriches Triton's Early College Program by offering students more flexibility and access to higher-paying careers while they're still in high school. It allows students to explore potential career paths, develop hands-on skills and earn industry certifications.

"Courses are available in the morning, afternoon and even evenings," Terrazas said. "Students are not limited to their high school cohort. The program can be customized to fit individual needs."

High school students interested in the Career Academy must contact their high schools before Feb. 21, 2025, for the 2026 academic year.

Sydney Babbington was drawn to a career as an ultrasound technician and chose Triton College for its exceptional educational programs, smaller class size and supporting learning environment.

Babbington is completing her clinicals with a focus on obstetrics. "Triton does a great job preparing you for clinicals," she said. "This field is so much more than I thought it was going to be. It's even better than I imagined."

Diagnostic medical sonography (ultrasound) is a fastgrowing medical specialty. Graduates of the program are well prepared to take the American Registry of Diagnostic Medical Sonography Certification Exams in the specialty areas of Sonographic Physics and Instrumentation, Abdomen, Obstetrics and Gynecology.
